The following are corrections and additions to RFP HTH 440-08-1, Substance Abuse Treatment Services Statewide.

**Sub-Category 5, Specialized Substance Abuse Treatment for Pregnant & Parenting Women and Children**

**III. Scope of Work, A. Service Activities, Page 2-5-21, Add the following:**

- d) **Recreational Activity Expenditures**, also known as clean and sober activities, shall be those activities in which clients learn to participate in recreational outings or activities that are free from alcohol, drugs and non-prescribed medication.

Each APPLICANT must submit in its proposal a description of the activity along with a list of yearly estimated expenditures for implementation of specific recreational activities, integration with treatment and agency activities (e.g. interdisciplinary treatment/service planning with regularly scheduled reviews), staff required, number of ADAD clients to be served for each activity and for the year, non-personnel costs (including but not limited to transportation and materials required for the recreational activities) and a Weekly Schedule with hours for all recreational activities.

Replace the existing paragraph with the following to item **IV. COMPENSATION AND METHOD OF PAYMENT, COST REIMBURSEMENT ACTIVITIES**: (This section was previously addressed in Addendum #1).

**COST REIMBURSEMENT ACTIVITIES:**

1. APPLICANTS may apply to be reimbursed for the provision of **Cultural Activities** on a cost reimbursement basis, as specified under Section III.A. **Service Activities**. Each APPLICANT must submit in its proposal a description of the activities it wishes to provide. ADAD will assess the request based on various factors, including but not limited to, the number of ADAD supported clients that would participate in the proposed cultural activity on an on-going and

consistent basis; if the cultural activity or practice is considered a integral component of the overall design of the program or service; and if the proposed cultural activity or practice is unable to be sustained on a unit reimbursement basis.

2. **Recreational Activity Expenditures**, also known as clean and sober activities, shall be those activities in which clients learn to participate in recreational outings or activities that are free from alcohol, drugs and non-prescribed medication.

Each APPLICANT must submit in its proposal a description of the activity along with a list of yearly estimated expenditures for implementation of specific recreational activities, integration with treatment and agency activities (e.g. interdisciplinary treatment/service planning with regularly scheduled reviews), staff required, number of ADAD clients to be served for each activity and for the year, non-personnel costs (including but not limited to transportation and materials required for the recreational activities) and a Weekly Schedule with hours for all recreational activities.

### **Section 2-B, Service Specifications, Sub-Category 2, Adolescent Substance Abuse Treatment Services, B. Adolescent School-Based Outpatient Treatment**

Page 2-2B-4

Under **D. Description of the target population to be served**

1. Delete “and Level II (Intensive Outpatient Treatment)” from the paragraph to read as follows:

The target population for **Adolescent School-Based Outpatient Treatment** is middle-school and high-school age adolescents who meet either the current **Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM)** of the American Psychiatric Association criteria for substance abuse or dependence or the current **American Society for Addiction Medicine Patient Placement Criteria (ASAM PPC)**. All clients in any level of treatment shall meet the most current version of the **ASAM** for admission, continuance, and discharge from Level 0.5 (Early Intervention) and Level I (Outpatient Treatment). Clients funded by ADAD must meet financial eligibility requirements. The income of clients eligible for treatment cannot exceed three hundred percent (300%) of the poverty level for Hawaii as defined by current Federal Poverty Level Standards that can be found at: [http://www.coverageforall.org/pdf/FHCE\\_FedPovertyLevel.pdf](http://www.coverageforall.org/pdf/FHCE_FedPovertyLevel.pdf)”
